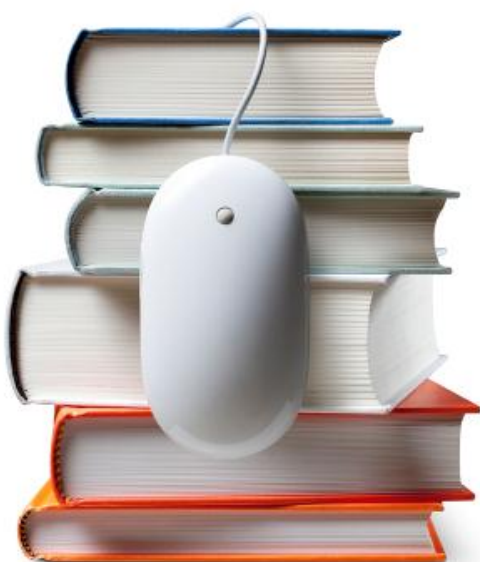

Coming Soon in the New Year

The new year brings new online resources which will further support the clinical, educational, and research needs of the university.

Two titles will soon be added to the joint UNMC/UNL ScienceDirect license: Polymer and Bioresources Technology.

The Archives of Facial Plastic Surgery will join the AMA collection of journals, which consists of JAMA and the Archives journals. Additionally, access to these journals will soon no longer require a special username and

password for full-text access. Of course, if you are accessing any of our resources from off-campus, you must first log in with your UNMC Net ID.

Stay tuned in 2012 for announcements regarding other new resources or exciting changes to current resources. You never know what will happen!

The McGoogan Library – More Than Just a Place

Welcome to the McGoogan Library newsletter. Our goal is to keep you in touch with library resources and services in a way that is manageable for you. While everyone is familiar with the library as a place and can navigate it with relative ease, our electronic resources are not as visible, are many times more extensive, and can be difficult to navigate at times. Imagine a library that is four to five times larger than our current 250,000 volume space in Wittson Hall and you begin to get an idea of the size of McGoogan’s electronic “footprint.”

The transition from print to virtual happened quickly. In 1997 the library still received 90% of its content in print. By 2010, 90% of it was being delivered and made available to you online. We work hard to make connections to that content easy and transparent. And to some degree we have succeeded because many UNMC and TNMC personnel are unaware the McGoogan Library has any role in providing the information that arrives at their desktop.

While it’s true there is a lot of free and valuable information on the Internet, the most recent research results and point-of-care clinical resources are off-limits to many. Publisher embargoes insure these crucial documents are available only to those who pay individually or institutionally for access. McGoogan Library handles institutional licensing on behalf of more than 7,500 UNMC and Nebraska Medical Center users, paying over \$1,000,000 annually to get you around embargoes. We cannot eliminate all of them, but we remove as many as we can for as many users as possible.

In addition to negotiating licenses and paying annual license fees, the library sets up access parameters with over 200 publishers, maintains the links to publishers’ servers, and

troubleshoots connection problems. The electronic infrastructure the library constructs is invisible, but without it, you would get “access denied” messages when you tried to connect directly to many of the 7,000+ electronic journals we license. The library creates the complex tables that allow publishers’ servers to recognize you when you click the GetIt@UNMC button following a PubMed search. Some users assume they can connect because “it’s all free on the Internet.” Nothing could be further from the truth. And without a lot of intricate, behind-the-scenes work, McGoogan users would be locked out of a global network of 10,000 interlibrary loan providers.

User surveys conducted in 2010 tell us faculty work would be more efficient, more productive, and less hassle if more extensive journal holdings were available. Students want a totally virtual workspace, period. Both are a stretch for McGoogan Library and the generous partners who support the resources and services we deliver. But we do want you to get the most out of the resources that are available. That’s the point of this newsletter -- to call new resources to your attention and point out useful features of the ones that are already available. We’ll try to serve you short, digestible bits of information with links that allow you to drill down as far as you want to go. We also want to introduce you to the talented and dedicated staff who navigate these resources on a daily basis and can help you do the same.

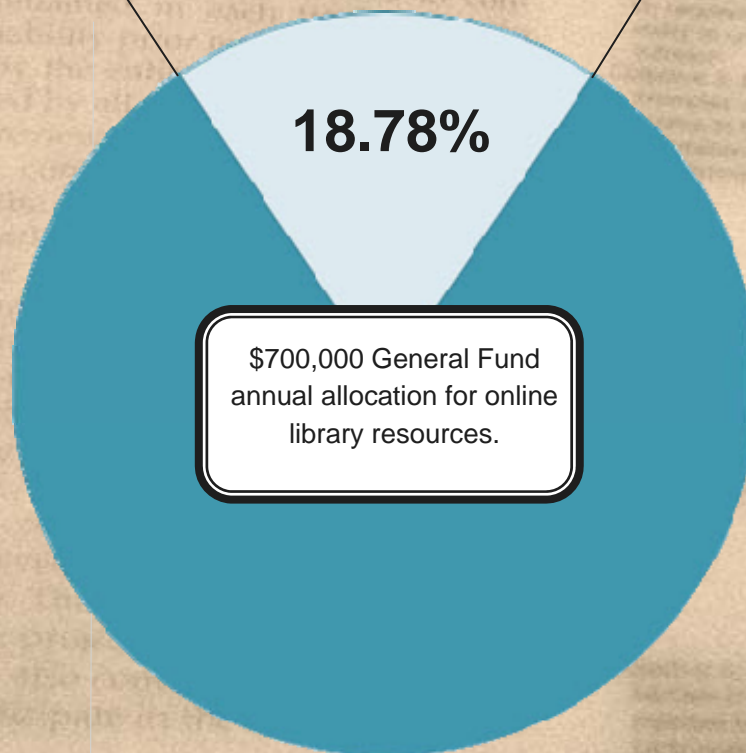

A **Answer:**

You probably have an empty in-text-citation-placeholder in your document (an empty set of curly brackets). The empty brackets may be hidden if you're using Write-n-Cite III. Follow the steps below to find the empty brackets and correct the problem:

1. If you are using Write-n-Cite III (WNC III), start by using the "Tools" menu to "Revert to WNC v.2". WNC v.2 has no hidden code. All empty citation placeholders will be visible.
2. Once you have converted to WNC v. 2, or if you are using WNC 2, use Word's Find feature to find instances of

(If you don't find an empty pair of squiggly brackets, don't despair. Proceed to the next step. Sometimes, simply reverting to WNC v.2 and then converting to WNC III will solve the 'null' 'not an object' errors.)
3. Save your document.
4. If you are using WNC III, use the WNC "Tools" menu to "Convert to WNC III"

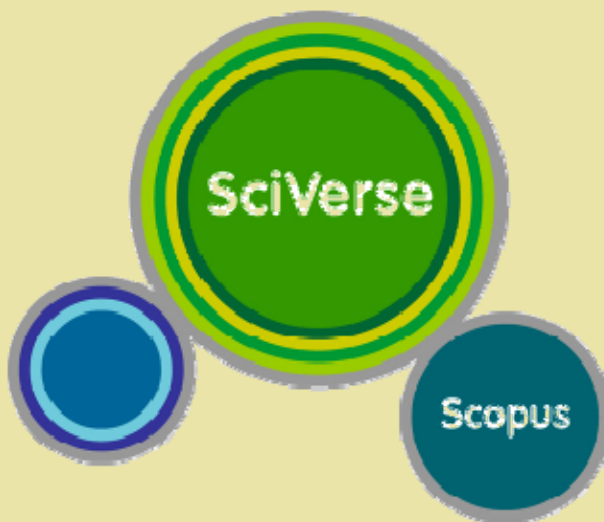

Scopus Replaces Web of Science

Scopus is a robust database that is the “largest abstract and citation database of peer-reviewed literature.” It includes 100% coverage of MEDLINE, in addition to social sciences databases and conference abstracts. Just like Web of Science, Scopus provides the function of citation tracking and alerts. Scopus also offers additional citation metrics and journal analyses.

The Scopus license is sponsored by the office of the Vice Chancellor for Research.

Q: What do UNMC and Google Scholar have in common?

A: UNMC full-text and RefWorks integration.

To effectively use Google Scholar, you should first add UNMC customizations to your browser or personal Google account.

1. Click on the gear in the upper right side of the Google Scholar screen and click *Scholar Preferences*.
2. Scroll down to the *Library Links* section and type *Nebraska* in the library box and click Search
3. Select *University of Nebraska Medical Center - UNMC eText* from the list (add UNL, UNK, and UNO if you wish, but this connection will not give you access to these collections.)
4. Scroll down to the *Bibliography Manager*, click the radio button next to *Show Links To Import Citations*, and select *RefWorks* in the drop-down menu.
5. Click the *Save Preferences* button on the bottom right of the page, which will return you to the search screen.

These steps may need to be repeated every few weeks, as the cookie saving your preferences may expire.

Now that you have customized Google Scholar, a link to the search mechanism for UNMC full-text and an *Import into RefWorks* link will accompany each citation. Please note that RefWorks can only import one citation at a time.

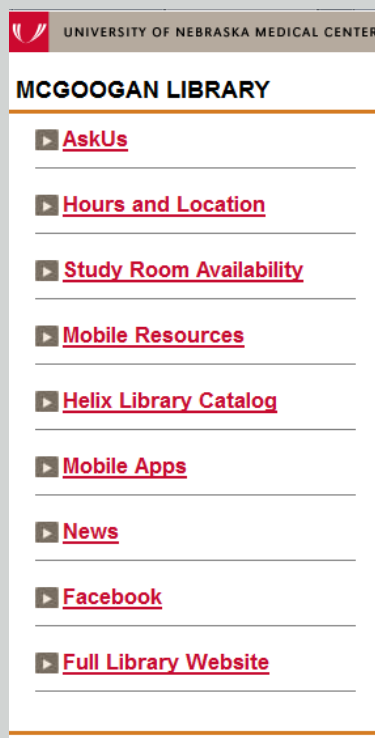

Journal cancellations

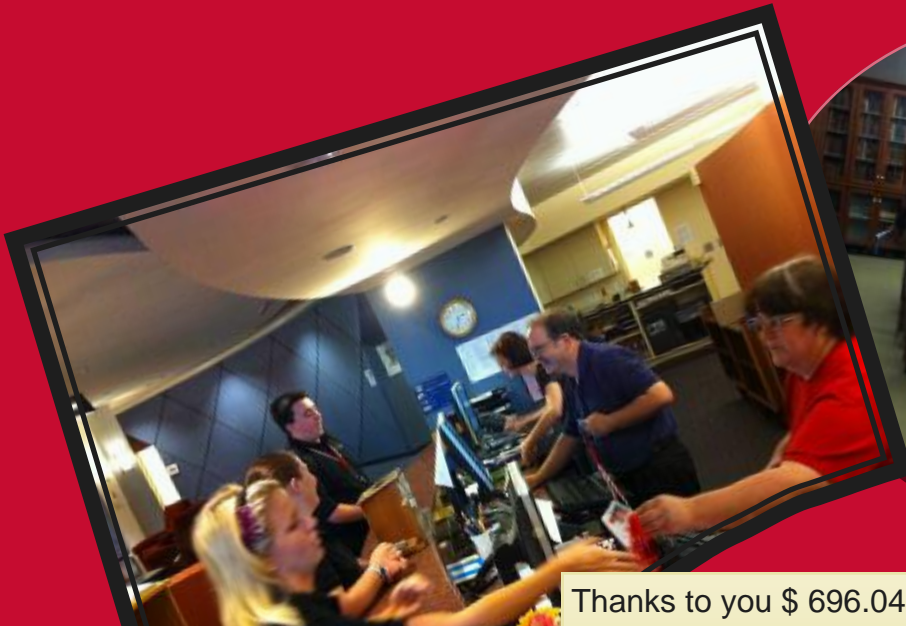
Each year, the library has to weigh usage and cost when determining which journals to cancel. This year, the list is short and includes the following titles.
